Shall we take a tent? That is the overnight camper's question. A bed be- 14 25 neath the stars sounds nice. But sometimes it's not practical. Most campers carry some kind of shelter. No one likes to wake up with rain or snow in 4/ the face or a soggy sleeping bag. Besides, there are many kinds of lightweight tents made for campers. Some have a floor and a netting over the 69 7 7 entrance. This makes them insect-proof, animal-proof, and waterproof. Stakes need not be much larger than a nail. Aluminum poles fold and can 9/1 65 be packed within the tent. All in all, a shelter can be quite compact. However, the fabric for the tent can be a problem A nylon tent is light 120 133 to carry, but it can hold moisture inside the tent and cause dampness. Waterproof cotton, on the other hand, isn't completely watertight. Campers 143# 2/58 solve the problem by using a cloth tent and placing a nylon or plastic cover over it. A shelter need not be a tent. A nylon groundcloth or a large piece 174 /%/ of plastic can be tied up to trees to give shelter. A poncho can be used for the same purpose. 194 When camping, pick a good campsite. An unnoticed gully could turn into a waterway if it rains during the night. A gentle stream can become a chilly neighbor at night. Choose a place where there is drinking water. Look for sources of fuelwood and try for level-ground. If you're lucky, you might even find a place with a view. Pitch your tent where it can get the morning sun. This way, it will dry out before you have to pack it away. Note where the wind is coming from before pitching your tent. The wind will blow off a lake and onto the shore at night. During the day, the wind will blow the other way. In some places, rain is rare and tents are not needed. A nice spot would be a rocky ledge that holds in the heat and blocks the night winds. An overhanging branch will provide a natural roof and clothes hooks. Don't camp under dead branches or in the path of rock slides. When breaking camp, be sure that your fire is out. Dump water on the ashes. Stir them in with the soil until you are sure that all of the embers are wet.
